Racial Identity Development Workshop MassArt Counseling and Wellness Center

Understanding racial/ethnic identity development is critical for faculty and staff to ally and support current college based civil rights activism. Becoming familiar with racial/ethnic identity theories and appreciating how this may be relevant to our students can help facilitate more meaningful conversations on our campus. Additionally, this learning gives context in order to empower staff and faculty with methods of solidarity and support for students.
